Any information you provide is kept private and can only be disclosed to relevant government agencies in accordance with prevailing legislation, regulations, standards and codes of practice:

- Child Wellbeing and Safety Act 2005 (Vic);
- Crimes Act 1958 (Vic);
- United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child;
- Victorian Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities;
- Victorian Child Safe Standards; and
- Working with Children Act 2005 (Vic).

Definition of Child Abuse

Child abuse is an act by parents or caregivers which endangers a child or young person's physical or emotional health or development. Child abuse can be a single incident, but usually takes place over time.

In Victoria, under the Children Youth and Families Act 2005 a child or young person is a person under eighteen years of age.

Types of Abuse

Physical abuse

Physical abuse occurs when a child suffers or is likely to suffer significant harm from an injury inflicted by a child's parent or caregiver. The injury may be inflicted intentionally or may be the inadvertent consequence of physical punishment or physically aggressive treatment of a child. The injury may take the form of bruises, cuts, burns or fractures.

Sexual abuse

Sexual abuse occurs when a person uses power or authority over a child to involve the child in sexual activity and the child's parent or caregiver has not protected the child. Physical force is sometimes involved. Child sexual abuse involves a wide range of sexual activity. It includes fondling of the child's genitals, masturbation, oral sex, vaginal or anal penetration by a penis, finger or other object, or exposure of the child to pornography.

Emotional abuse

Emotional Abuse occurs when a child's parent or caregiver repeatedly rejects the child or uses threats to frighten the child. This may involve name calling, put downs or continual coldness from the parent or caregiver, to the extent that it significantly damages the child's physical, social, intellectual or emotional development.

Neglect

Neglect is the failure to provide the child with the basic necessities of life such as food, clothing, shelter, medical attention or supervision, to the extent that the child's health and development is, or is likely to be, significantly harmed.

The Standards seek to create a culture and environment that is supportive and protective of children and young people under the age of 18, in addition to your organisation's policies and procedures. The Standards are minimum Standards. The Standards should reinforce each other rather than be considered as separate individual areas.



Sexual Abuse Prevention Programs

Where relevant to the setting or context, children and young people are offered access to sexual abuse prevention programs and to relevant related information in an age-appropriate way.

As a child, you have a right to safety and a sense of wellbeing. This is true no matter what your age, gender, culture, religion, sexual identity, education level, or where you live.

Focus

A particular focus for the Standards is recognition that children or young people under the age of 18 from some groups are at a higher risk of abuse than others. As such, each of the Standards must also be understood and applied in the context of:

- The cultural safety of Aboriginal children and young people under the age of 18
- The cultural safety of children and young people under the age of 18 from a culturally and/or linguistically diverse background
- The safety of children and young people under the age of 18 with a disability.

Responding and Reporting

If a child If a child is at immediate risk of harm, the RTO must ensure their safety by:

- Separating alleged victims and others involved
- · Administering first aid if needed



- Calling 000 for urgent medical and/or police assistance to respond to immediate health or safety concerns
- Identifying a contact person in your organisation for future liaison with Police.

The OR 10.1.3 MST Child Safe Incident Form must be completed. The form should have clear and comprehensive notes in relation to the suspected child abuse.

Complaints & Appeals

MST approach to managing complaints and appeals ensures that all clients, students, employers and other stakeholders are aware of the steps to take to have their dissatisfaction addressed appropriately.

Any formal complaints that are lodged by a child must be investigated by a Child Safety Officer.
